A Message from the Mayor:

Fiscal Responsibility in Action



Dear Edgewood Residents,

As your Mayor, I remain committed to transparency especially when it comes to how we manage your tax dollars. With the City Council finalizing the budget for the upcoming fiscal year, I want to take a moment to share the principles guiding our decisions and how they directly benefit you as residential and commercial property owners.

For the sixth consecutive year, Edgewood City Council has kept the millage rate at 5.25 mills. This reflects our ongoing commitment to fiscally conservative budgeting and long-term planning. City Council and staff have worked diligently to control costs, increase efficiency, and avoid unnecessary spending allowing us to continue delivering high-quality services without increasing your property tax rate.

This accomplishment is especially meaningful given the financial pressures we've faced. Notably, the Orange County Commission approved a 26% increase in the Fire and Rescue ad valorem rate last year, now set at 2.8437 mills. Despite that, your City Council voted once again to hold the line and not raise Edgewood's tax rate.

Understanding the Numbers: Millage Rate Comparison

It's important to understand how Edgewood's tax rate compares to neighboring governments. At first glance, Unincorporated Orange County's millage rate of 4.37 may seem lower, but that figure excludes their separate Fire and Rescue tax. By contrast, Edgewood's single 5.25 rate covers all city services, including fire and police.

<u>Ashley Pagán</u>




on her boys at baseball and iced coffee. In her role, Ashley values building connections with residents and businesses and is passionate about local government's role in creating stronger and more vibrant communities.



Where Your Tax Dollars Go

The City collects \$2,512,538 in ad-valorem revenue each year, yet the combined costs of Fire & Rescue (\$1,325,120) and Police Services (\$2,331,725) already exceed that total. All other essential services, such as roads & streets, stormwater management, grounds maintenance, and City Hall operations, are funded through other revenue sources, including utility franchise fees, state revenue sharing, and non-ad valorem assessments.





We're proud to report that Edgewood remains debt-free, a direct result of our commitment to financial discipline. Each year, we review the budget line-by-line, identifying ways to reduce waste, streamline services, and prioritize value in every contract and initiative.

Looking ahead, we will continue to be responsible stewards of your tax dollars, ensuring that Edgewood remains a safe, well-maintained, and vibrant community for all. Thank you for your trust, your support, and for helping make Edgewood a truly special place to call home.

New Super Speeder Law

As of July 1, 2025, a new Super Speeder traffic law took effect to address the problem of excessive speeding. Florida State Statute 316.1922 now makes it an arrestable offense whenever a person operates a motor vehicle 50 mph over the posted speed limit, or

at 100 mph or more in a manner that threatens the safety of other persons or property or interferes with the operation of any vehicle.

Upon conviction, a first-time offender can be imprisoned in the county jail for up to 30 days or fined \$500, or both. Second or subsequent convictions can result in imprisonment up to 90 days or fined \$1,000 or both. A person convicted of a second or subsequent violation of this law within 5 years shall have their driving privileges revoked for at least 180 days but no more than 1 year.

Preliminary data provided to News 6 by the Florida Highway Patrol shows that 55 drivers across Central Florida have been arrested under the excessive speeding law. Edgewood Police Officers routinely work speed enforcement on Orange Avenue and its side streets. Remember to give yourself some extra time to get to your destination so you do not feel the need to speed.

DON'T LET POLLUTION GO DOWN THE DRAIN

WHAT IS STORMWATER AND WHY IT MATTERS

Stormwater is rain that falls on yards, streets, parking lots, and buildings. Instead of soaking into the ground, much of it flows into storm drains or directly into lakes, streams, and rivers. Unlike wastewater, stormwater does not go to a treatment plant. What enters the drain usually flows straight into our natural waterways.

As it moves across lawns, driveways, and roads, stormwater collects fertilizers, oil, grass clippings, litter, pet waste, and other pollutants. These materials are then carried through a network of drains, pipes, and ditches to collection ponds or, in many cases, into nearby water bodies.

Pollution from stormwater has real impacts. Sediment from construction sites clouds the water and damages habitats. Excess nutrients from fertilizers and yard waste cause harmful algal blooms that deplete oxygen and threaten fish. Bacteria from pet waste and failing septic systems can close swimming areas and boat ramps. Trash like plastic bags, bottles, and cigarette butts harms wildlife, while hazardous chemicals such as pesticides, paint, and motor oil poison aquatic life and even affect human health.

Stormwater pollution is one of the most serious threats to our lakes and rivers, but it is also one we can help prevent. By properly disposing of waste, reducing fertilizer use, cleaning up after pets, and keeping litter off the streets, we all play a part in protecting our waterways and ensuring a healthier environment for generations to come.
